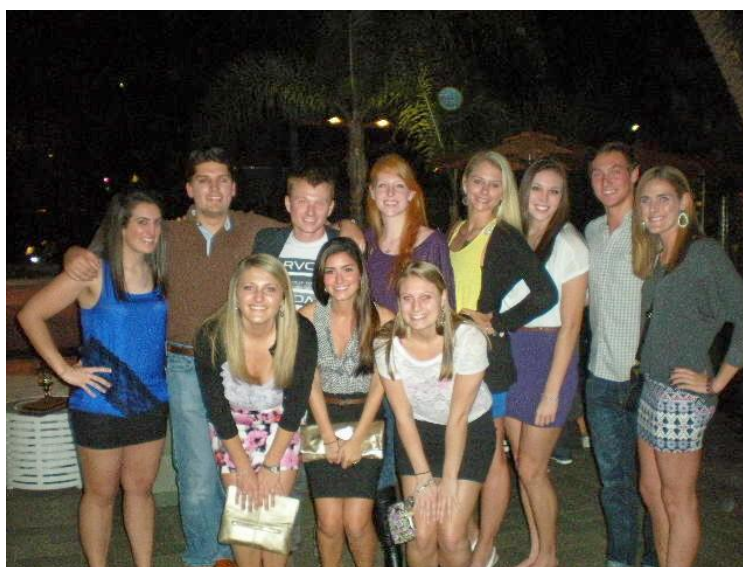

A Student of High Point University is Published

Catherine Hendricks is a senior of High Point University. She has been working on research since she was a sophomore, in both science and theology departments. While she studied abroad in Scotland during her junior year, she worked on an idea for theology. Her research is titled "Possible World Theory and Why it Matters". The

main focus was why evil exists and why the world is better with evil in it. She started this paper just for honors credit; she had no intention of showing it at a conference, and never believed that it would get published. When she completed her work, her advisor, Dr. Clint Corkrin, read it and encouraged her to present her work at a

conference. She attended the North Georgia Student Philosophy Conference where she read her essay in front of a panel of three judges and they had a discussion about her ideas. She left thinking that her research was finished. Then, this fall, she got a call. Her work was accepted for publication in the NGSPC proceedings!

Students take their independent projects to research conferences and performance competitions to share their work with professional communities. On April 13, 2012 Winthrop University will host the 5th Big South Undergraduate Research Symposium (BigSURS). Students will be presenting their research in oral and poster sessions on this date.



Laura May's Research Journey

Laura May is a sophomore at High Point University and is just beginning her own independent study. Laura's research reflects her interests in both music and non-profit. She was able to combine her interests and formulate an independent study. She plans to study how music influences non-profit fundraising.

She first brought her idea to her music professor Dr. Foster. He helped her get her plan into motion. Laura now has three advisers: Dr. Foster (music), Dr. Cugliari (non-profit), and Dr. Altman (URCW). They have been helping her define her research questions and methods.

She is currently in the process of completing the IRB form. IRB stands for *Institutional Review Board* and is a federally mandated committee that reviews, approves, and monitors all research that involves humans. An IRB Application must be submitted before any research with human subjects can be conducted. The board protects the rights and privacy of the participants. It also makes sure the research is ethical.

These are just the first few steps of Laura's journey. She has much more to do and there will be many more updates to come!

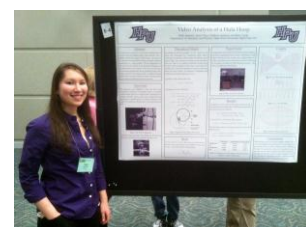

The call for submissions is now open.

Submission deadline is March 16. Students will be notified of the acceptance of their project by April 2.

Participation Guidelines:

Presentation formats include posters, oral presentations, readings, performances, and exhibited art or other displays.

Projects should be mentored, independent work that reflect originality and creativity in one's discipline and be quality work that went beyond a course assignment. If you have any questions about what is a suitable project to propose, please contact Dr. Joanne Altman, Director of Undergraduate Research and Creative Works at jaltman0@highpoint.edu or 841-9613.

Presentations should be no longer than 15 minutes.

Submission includes two abstracts/descriptions: a short 50-word (max) abstract that will be published in our program, and a longer 250-word (max) description for the review.

Projects must be approved by a faculty mentor. Students are instructed to complete the form and send it to their faculty mentor (not to submit it). Mentors will submit the form.
