As a department, our goal is to inform you of students' past accomplishments and future opportunities available within the realms of collaborative research and creative works. We hope to share the success stories of students who have completed scholarly and creative work and to inspire students to enrich their own undergraduate experience.



CUNNUR WHICKER SURF JUNIOR

What are your plans for your summer research project? I will be working on the NIH Grant: Real-time Optimized Biofeedback Utilizing Sport Techniques which is an intervention based program. The subjects are adolescent female soccer players who complete pre-testing in hip strength, agility, and biomechanical motion screening. Each subject then completes an intervention focused on strength, plyometrics, core strengthening as well as biofeedback. The study is hoping to examine whether biofeedback in addition to intervention techniques can help train proper landing mechanics allowing athletes to land in less at risk positions that lead to ACL tears.



What are you most excited about regarding your upcoming summer research experience?

I am excited to grow as a researcher and hopefully develop knowledge that can translate into my clinical practice as an athletic training student.

SARAH FORGET SURPS JUNIOR

What are your plans for your summer research project?

I will be continuing the research I have been doing for the past year with Dr. Hughes. We are researching an evergreen fern, Polystichum acrostichoides. This fern stands tall in summer and falls flat in winter. We have already done experiments to see if changing the position of fronds stresses the plants. We have measured photosynthesis, fluorescence, temperature, and more to assess plant stress. This summer we plan to do a few more tests, but the main focus will be to write up a paper and try to get it published.

What are you most excited about regarding your upcoming summer research experience? I am most excited to work on a paper, and the possibility of it getting published. I enjoy the field and want to go to graduate school for something similar. Getting all of this research experience will give me skills to be more competitive and competent for the career I would like to pursue.

KATIE JAMES SURI JUNIUR

What are your plans for your summer research project?

The title of the project is "The impact of feedback on college students' academic motivation and self-esteem." We collected data in Spring 2017 using the following method: Participants first answered several questions concerning demographics, Holland Codes Assessment, PISQ-5D, and the Ultrecht-Management of Identity Commitments Scale. They then waited 2-7 days before completing session two which involved receiving feedback, answering open-ended questions, taking the Situational Motivation Scale and Rosenberg Self-Esteem Scale. After completing these forms, they were completely debriefed as to the true nature of the study. I intend to collect more data in this method as well as work on developing a content analysis coding scheme to assess the existing open-ended responses in hopes of qualitatively identifying spillover effects from the negative feedback (essentially attempting to answer, "why doesn't negative feedback impact self-esteem across commitment groups?"). After completing these processes and analyzing the data, I intend to prepare abstracts for submission to both regional and national conferences.


What are you most excited about regarding your upcoming summer research experience? I am excited to begin the writing process for this project. I have invested so much time and energy into the project for the past year so I am looking forward to running more analyses and writing a paper for submission so that others can learn about my study and its results!

In the immediate future, I plan to submit finished abstracts to conferences and manuscripts to *Innovation* and other journals. Beyond that, I hope to further develop my skills in research by qualitatively analyzing the open-ended questions. This research experience will not only give me an advantage when applying to graduate school, but give me the skills I need to successfully complete a Master's thesis or doctoral program dissertation. I am incredibly interested in career counseling and intend to pursue industrial organizational psychology and/or career counseling. By researching the impact negative feedback has on a student's motivation and self-esteem, I will better understand students' emotional responses to negative feedback like receiving a failing grade on an important test or aversive feedback from a professional. Knowing whether students are more or less likely to change their major due to these negative stimuli would aid in my ability to assist students in selecting and pursuing a career field as well as better my understanding of undergraduate students' motivations.

SENIOR HIGHLIGHT MELANIE SAVAGE

Graduating Senior, Melanie Savage, a Criminal Justice major with Spanish and Psychology minors, had a moment to chat with us about her successful involvement in undergraduate research and the impact it has had on her college experience as well as her future plans.

How would you describe your experience through the Undergraduate Programs at HPU? MS: My experience throughout the undergraduate programs has been amazing and unforgettable. I have built impactful relationships with professors and students that will last for the rest of my life. The programs are challenging, yet academically stimulating.



How would you say your undergraduate research experience has affected your future?

MS: My undergraduate research has opened many more doors and opportunities for me. With my successes in research and class work I have been able to apply to job positions not otherwise available to college graduates.

What experience within HPU undergraduate research are you most thankful for? Is there an experience that stood out to you?

MS: I am most grateful for the strong ties and relationships that I formed with faculty members and the research community. My attendance of the National Criminal Justice Conference stood out to me the most as it was an amazing opportunity and experience in which I was able to share my findings with the academic community.

Do you have any advice to students considering involvement in URCW? Why would you recommend the URCW

experience?

MS: My advice to future students would be that if they have this amazing opportunity they should absolutely take part in it. It broadens your academic knowledge and understanding outside of the classroom. This experience also demonstrates your drive to work above and beyond the typical undergraduate requirements.

What are your plans after graduation? What are you most excited about?

MS: I am immensely excited about my application with the secret service. Although I am not fully through their application process, I am on the road to its completion and I don't think that this would be possible without my participation in this program.

Congrats, Melanie, on all of your successes! We wish you the best and know you will do extraordinary things!



The awarded projects are those that best articulate interdisciplinary studies, defined as "a mode of research by teams or individuals that integrates information, data, techniques, tools, perspectives, concepts, and/or theories from two or more disciplines or bodies of specialized knowledge to advance fundamental understanding or to solve problems whose solutions are beyond the scope of a single discipline or area of research practice."
