ABSTRACT **DEADLINE: OCTOBER** 15TH

The deadline for submitting to the State of North Carolina Undergraduate

Research and Creativity Symposium (SNCURCS)

is fast approaching, and it's time to submit your abstract. If you've worked with a professor on a research project or a creative work of art, consider submitting to the (virtual) SNCURCS of 2021 -- with no registration fees.

SNCURCS is one of the largest research symposiums in the state of North Carolina and available to all North Carolina students.

While normally held at North Carolina college institutions and previously hosted by HPU in 2015, this year the symposium will be cohosted virtually by Elon University, Catawba College, and Livingtson College November 13th.

If you're interested in submitting research to be presented at SNCURCS, speak with your advisor about preparing an abstract. The deadline for submitting an abstract is October 15th at 11:59pm. Find more information and dates regarding SNCURCS at www.sncurcs.org.


SNCURCS: State of North Carolina Undergraduate Research and Creativity Symposium. Will be hosted virtually November 12-13th.

A Reflection on Research

SITTING DOWN WITH LESLIE BOSSE '22

Senior English major Leslie Bosse knows a thing or two about research—particularly how long it takes and how much time is spent with a project. After two years of presenting research, we sat down with Leslie to ask her what she's gained from the last few years of study and scholarly work.

In 2018, Leslie was a freshman honors student taking Dr. Carlson's Detective Fiction First Year Seminar. She loved the course content and was particularly drawn to it the following semester when she took another one of Dr. Carlson's Scottish Literature course. Pulling from literature referenced in both classes, Leslie worked with Dr. Carlson on research that she submitted to MMLA, the Midwest Modern Language Association Conference. Sponsored by the URCW grant, Leslie traveled to Chicago to present her work in the fall of 2019. Leslie said that without the intentionality and mentorship of Dr. Carlson, she never would have thought to submit her work.

The following year, Leslie worked with Dr. Carlson again on research centered around Northrop Frye's Theory of Comedy and The Secret Garden. Leslie was able to present this research at High-PURCS. When we asked Leslie how she's grown over the years, Leslie said she had gained confidence that she'd never had before. It was through actively working on research outside of class alongside a professor that she realized she could not only accomplish high-level scholarly work, but that she could do it well.

Now, as Leslie prepares for her future beyond HPU, she says she doesn't fear landing the perfect job. "I understand how to present myself and I know what I'm good at," Leslie declares with a grounded assurance that she'll be capable of whatever she takes on. She says the time conducting research in the English department has honed her networking skills and provided professional relationships that feel like friendships.
